


The tool is a fun and easy way to get your community's feedback on several options. It's a possibility for people to vote on different options. It is also a possibility to give your community the possibility to expand on your thoughts. The tool is very intuitive and can enable you to get quick feedback even from children as it does not require a lot of effort and can be explained simply. The tool is especially helpful if you are in your research and exploration phase and are trying to get answers on your planned implementation. It is also a great tool for evaluating your placemaking project.



# back-

The sticker democracy tool was used in a multicultural high school in Oslo as part of the PlaceCity - Placemaking for Sustainable, Thriving Cities project. Oslo Living Lab's youth research team had conducted several studies and found out that young people as well as the local community was wishing for more activities on weekends and after school hours.

The youth researchers were wondering which activities students from the high school were particularly interested to participate in. They stated a variety of free time activities ranging from concerts, sports teams to a carpenter and makeup workshops to outdoor movie nights. The tool made it possible for the youth researchers to get many voices as participation in the research was quick and easy. This created a solid base for them to consult Nabolagshager on further steps on implementing placemaking activities.

# step

1.

Think about what you would like people to give you feedback on and vote on. Come up with a question.

2.

Print out pictures to illustrate your different options and your question.

3.

Get stickers and prepare as many stickers per person as you would like to give them votes. You can give them for example three or five votes depending on how many options you have.

4.

Have a poster with space for people to give you written feedback or further ideas. Prepare post-its and pens for this poster. And remember to bring something to hang up your posters.

5.

Team up with an event or go to a place you are likely to meet your local community and invite them to participate. If you would like to incentivize them you could do a little prize raffle. Or you could offer snacks and drinks to everyone who participates.

6.

Count the votes and share the results with your local community. Take the outcomes further for your implementation or next project.
